Due to ongoing and evolving COVID-19 pandemic, callers may experience increased wait times when calling the Government of Canada Pension Center. Callers may also experience dropped calls, as all telecommunication networks across Canada are presently facing capacity challenges. and local Media Articles and An illness or injury can have an impact on your ability to adjust to life after service. **If you have received a disability benefit, you may also qualify for the Additional Pain and Suffering Compensation—a tax-free, monthly benefit — payable for life.** Have you made an application for disability benefits from Veterans Affairs Canada and received a decision? If you disagree with that decision, you have the right to review or appeal it. The attendance allowance helps to cover the cost of hiring a caregiver to assist you in your day-to-day life. The amount you can receive is based on the level of care you need, from occasional to full-time supervision and care. **The amount of the allowance is based on a grade from 1-5 that reflects the nature of your disability.**

2020 Navy Bike Ride Goes Virtual

Each year, the Navy Bike Ride, held in the Ottawa, works to celebrate Canadian Veterans and the sacrifices that they made, while raising funds to support them and their families. In honour of those who have served in the Battle of the Atlantic, this year's Navy Bike Ride is dedicated to their remembrance and Veterans Affairs Canada is proud to be a supporting partner of this event.

During the Battle of the Atlantic 75 years ago, the Canadian Navy and Merchant Marine devoted their service and bravery, risking their lives to ensure critical supplies would reach their destination. This exhaustive effort saw more than 25,000 voyages undertaken, showing inspiring courage and resilience.

As our country now faces a new challenge, in battling the spread of COVID-19, the Navy Bike Ride has expanded, moving online. To honour those who have served Canada, while ensuring the safety of all Canadians we encourage the Veteran community, their families and friends, and the Canadian public to participate in a virtual bike ride. COVID-19: New Canada Border Services Agency Travel App

We would also like to take the opportunity to share for awareness that a new travel app, called ArriveCAN, is now available for use by travellers entering Canada.

The ArriveCAN mobile application and accessible [web app](#), developed by the Public Health Agency of Canada and the Canada Border Services Agency,

provides a digital way for all travellers entering Canada to easily and securely submit their information and complete a self-assessment of symptoms up to 48 hours before they arrive in Canada.

The ArriveCAN app is available for free on [Google Play](#) and [Apple App](#) stores. The use of ArriveCAN will help the Government of Canada communicate with travellers via push notifications, and for those travellers required to quarantine or isolate, to promote and verify their compliance with requirements under the Quarantine Act and to record any voluntary report of symptoms of COVID-19 during their 14-day quarantine period.

Attendance Allowance

Attendance Allowance is an additional tax-free monthly assistance to individuals who:

- have a Disability Pension of 1% or more or receive Prisoner of War compensation;
- are totally disabled, whether by reason of military service or not; AND
- need help with daily living tasks.

The amount payable is based on the degree of attendance needed for your day-to-day personal care.

If you have a serious disability you may need the help of a caregiver on a daily basis. The attendance allowance helps to cover the cost of hiring a caregiver to assist you in your day-to-day life.

About this program

The attendance allowance helps to cover the cost of hiring a caregiver to assist you in your day-to-day life. The amount you can receive is based on the level of care you need, from occasional to full-time supervision and care.

The amount of the allowance is based on a grade from 1-5 that reflects the nature of your disability.

Do you qualify?

You should apply for attendance allowance if you:

- Have a disability pension of 1% or more or receive Prisoner of War compensation
- Are totally disabled, whether your condition was service-related or not

- Need assistance with [activities of daily living](#) (such as eating, bathing, dressing, or moving)

How to apply

Before you submit

In most cases, you do not need to submit an application for this allowance. Your case manager will apply for you based on the medical questionnaire you submitted as part of your disability benefits application.

If you believe that you, or someone you know, is eligible for this allowance you can [contact us](#) or your case manager. You can also apply online, or by mail or in person.

Apply online

If you are registered for My VAC Account, you can submit your application for this benefit online. If you aren't registered, you can [register now](#).

Mail or in person

Download the application form. Then, drop it off at a [VAC office](#). You can also mail your completed application directly to the address listed on the form.

Frequently asked questions

How much could I receive?

The amount you receive depends on the nature of your disability. A grade level between 1 and 5 is assigned depending on the impact your disability has on your ability to live independently. Grade 1 is the highest grade. See the [current rates](#).

If I apply for the benefit and get declined, can I appeal?

Caregiver Recognition Benefit

A monthly payment increased annually by the Consumer Price Index. The current payment is \$1,043.46 per month.

This income replacement provides 90% of your gross pre-release military salary while you are participating in Rehabilitation services. This ensures a pre-tax income of at least \$49,523.40 per year.

If you had wartime service and your income is higher than the maximum level because you or your spouse/common-law partner receive OAS benefits, in certain cases, you may qualify for treatment benefits.

The Critical Injury Benefit is a \$76,077.58 tax-free lump-sum award to address the immediate impacts of the most severe and traumatic service-related injuries or diseases sustained by Canadian Armed Forces members.

The death benefit is a one-time, tax-free amount of \$381,278.82 paid to a spouse or common-law partner and any dependent children if a CAF member dies while in service.
